KAPSI Announces International Conference on

Child Development in Family, School and Cultural Contexts: With Specific Focus on Asia's Educational Miracle

Hosted by Educational Research Institute, Inha University, Incheon, Korea October 28-29, 2006

The Korean Association of Psychological and Social Issues (KAPSI, www.kapsi.or.kr) announces an international conference on *Child Development in Family, School and Cultural Contexts: With Specific Focus on Asia's Educational Miracle*, October 28-29, 2006 at Inha University, Incheon, Korea. The goal of this conference is to examine child development and educational attainment of children and adolescents and the familial, instructional and cultural factors that contribute to a high level of achievement. It will also examine the costs involved in the pressure to achieve, such as stress, delinquency and school violence. The conference encourages interdisciplinary participation and discussion. The main objectives of the conference are as follows:

- 1. To examine the factors that explain the high educational attainment of Asian students, contributing to *Asia's Educational Miracle*.
- 2. To critically examine existing psychological and educational theories and to discuss possible theoretical and conceptual elaborations.
- 3. To examine the role that family, school, community, society and culture play in promoting the high achievement of students.
- 4. To examine the cost of the pressure to achieve, especially for those adolescents who are not able to be high achievers and who suffer from psychological and social problems.
- 5. To examine those adolescents who engage in problem behaviors, becoming either a bully or a victim of school violence and those who engage in truancy, delinquency, or drop out of the school system.

We will also examine background and contextual factors that contribute to the understanding of academic achievement, school violence and problem behaviors:

- 1. To examine socialization practices and parent-child relationship.
- 2. To examine peer relationship and social support network.
- 3. To examine the role of teachers and schools.
- 4. To examine diverse teaching methods, curriculum and a school environment that promotes curiosity, creativity and achievement.
- 5. To examine counseling and preventive programs for problem and delinquent behavior.

Finally, the conference encourages interdisciplinary dialogue and participation by addressing the above issues from psychological, social and cultural viewpoints. Although the theme of this conference focuses on Asia, we would like to explore factors that facilitate or impede educational attainment and quality of life globally and from a life-span perspective:

- 1. To examine healthy human development throughout an individual's life-span.
- 2. To examine factors that promote health and quality of life.
- 3. To examine development trajectories, community integrity, career selection and achievement in organizational settings.
- 4. To examine positive aging and social integration.
- 5. To examine social change, fertility rate and the value of children.

The conference will become a forum for establishing the Asian Association of Educational and Developmental Psychology and for launching the Asian Journal of Educational and Developmental Psychology. We will also collaborate with the Asian Association of Social Psychology to explore the possibility of establishing a larger umbrella organization, tentatively named the Asian Association of Psychology. We hope to become the third force in psychology and become a counterpart to the American Psychological Association and the European Federation of Psychologists' Association.

Site of the conference

The conference will be held at Inha University (www.inha.ac.kr/english), Incheon, South Korea (http://english.tour2korea.com). Incheon is the third largest city in South Korea, located 40km west of Seoul.

Structure of the Conference

The conference will consist of keynote presentations, invited addressees, symposia, paper sessions and poster sessions. Keynote and invited speakers will be given 30 minutes for their presentation, oral presenters will be given 20 minutes, and two hours will be devoted to the poster session.

Interested participants should submit a 150-word abstract, which includes title, author and institutional affiliation, along with the registration form. For symposium submissions, please include a 100-word introduction, list of participants and abstracts of the participants. The deadline for submission is *September 15*, 2006.

Registration

The registration fee can be paid on site. The fee includes program, book of abstracts, two lunches, two dinners, snacks, beverages, cultural shows and a 2-year membership in the Asian Association for Education and Developmental Psychology.
